PROGRAMME NOTES:

The music of John Rutter is synonymous with beautiful, singable melodies, and there is no doubt that he has a great gift for writing music which both singers and audiences enjoy. He is, rightly, known and loved for his Christmas carols and for the colourful arrangements which are so much a feature of the *Carols for Choirs* series. But there is much more to his compositional output, and many of his pieces take inspiration from, and are influenced by, music of the British and French choral tradition of the late 19th and early 20th century.

The first half of tonight's programme focuses on two things: the music of Charles Wood – whose 150^{th} anniversary falls this year – and on some of the beautiful styles of music which have resonances with Rutter's *Requiem* (which forms the second half of the programme).

Charles Wood (1866-1926) – like his more well-known teacher, Charles Stanford – was born in Ireland but studied and worked in England for much of his life. His Anglican choral music is a staple of every cathedral choir's repertoire (he wrote ten different settings of the Magnificat & Nunc Dimittis!), but his output was prolific, including six string quartets, a piano concerto, several cantatas and many songs. The three anthems featured tonight are fine examples of his craftsmanship in setting words in a simple, homophonic style.

The influence of the music of Herbert Howells (1892-1983) - a pupil of Charles Wood's at the Royal College of Music – on both English choral music generally and, specifically, on John Rutter is undeniable, so it seemed appropriate to include one of his anthems in this programme. Charles Stanford's *Justorum animae* is from a set of three Latin motets, which hint at the influence of the great 19th century Germanic composers, Bruckner and Brahms. And the European style is also exemplified in the flowing melodic writing of Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924) in the 4 movements of his *Messe Basse*, written for upper voices and organ.

PERSONNEL:

Julian Thomas - Musical Director

Julian joined the North Downs Consort as Musical Director at the beginning of 2016, replacing our previous Musical Director, Sarah Latto.

He began his musical training as a chorister at Salisbury Cathedral and then as a music and academic scholar at Charterhouse, before going up to Cambridge as Organ Scholar at Jesus College. After graduating, he moved to Lincoln Cathedral as Second Assistant Organist, becoming a prizewinning Fellow of the Royal College of Organists in 2000.



For the next six years, Julian was the Assistant Organist & Director of the Girls' Choir at Norwich Cathedral, during which time he regularly appeared on both radio and television accompanying and conducting choirs. In addition to this, he also directed the Edington Music Festival, including overseeing the 50th festival and a number of significant choral commissions.

Since 2007, Julian has been Choirmaster at Tonbridge School, and he is also now Head of Academic Music. Alongside these roles, Julian is a published composer and maintains an active career as a freelance organist. He regularly deputises at a number of London churches, including the Chapel Royal and St Bride's Fleet Street, and also works with several adult choirs, such as *Canticum* and *London Concert Choir*. As a recitalist, he has performed recently at the Temple Church, London, Westminster Abbey, Gloucester, Southwark, Portsmouth and Westminster Cathedrals.

He is delighted to be working now with the North Downs Consort, and hopes to be able to share some of his enjoyment of music through this choir's singing too.

lan Le Grice - Organ

One time head chorister and soloist of the Temple Church and prize winning student at the Royal College of Music, Ian was a member of the team of distinguished organists of the Temple Church for 30 years until he stepped down in 2013.

In addition to his work as a recitalist he has played for services, concerts, recordings and broadcasts with many leading musicians, including Sir George Thalben-Ball, Sir David Willcocks, Sir John Tavener, Jack Brymer, John Rutter, Stephen Layton and Crispian Steele-Perkins with whom he has collaborated since 2005 to present informal concerts of trumpet and organ music.



He is currently the organist of the Godfrey Searle Choir, accompanist of the St. Cecilia Chorus, the English Arts Chorale, and the Croydon Philharmonic Choir of which he is a Vice President.

Jonathan Percival - Cello

Jonathan is a Year 10 Music Scholar at Tonbridge School having previously been a pupil at Bickley Park school in Bromley. He learns the cello with Ben Rogerson and the piano with Seta Tanyel, and is studying for GCSE music next Summer. Music is firmly a part of family life, indeed his grandfather worked in the music industry with figures such as José Carreras.

Alexander Trigg - Oboe

Alexander joined Tonbridge School last September having previously been a chorister in the internationally-famous choir of King's College, Cambridge. In addition to his singing, he learns the oboe with Nancy Sargeant, piano with Seta Tanyel, violin with Andrew Pearson, organ with Robin Walker, and he also plays the organ at St. Lawrence Church, Seal. Unsurprisingly, he too comes from a musical family!
